It's a beautiful afternoon in Kabul and the skies are full of the excitement and joy of a kite flying tournament. But neither Hassan or Amir can foresee the terrible incident which will shatter their lives forever...

The Kite Runner, published in 2003, was Khaled Hosseini's first novel. It became an instant bestseller across the globe and has since been published in 70 countries, selling 31.5 million copies in 60 languages.

The Kite Runner is adapted by Matthew Spangler and directed by Giles Croft. It is produced by Martin Dodd for UK Productions and Derek Nicol & Paul Walden for Flying Entertainment. It was originally produced by Nottingham Playhouse and Liverpool Everyman and Playhouse.

His TV credits include: Tom Hardy's *Taboo, Dead Set* (BAFTA winner), *The 7.39* (BAFTA nominated).

Hanif Khan is a professional tabla player and teacher. He has performed both nationwide and internationally at major music festivals and events. He has worked with some of the leading exponents of Indian classical music such as: Hariprasad Chaurasia, Rajan and Sajan Mishra, Ronu Majumdar, Nishat Khan, amongst others. Audiences have included Prince Phillip, Prince Charles and Sir Paul McCartney.

Matthew Spangler (Stage Adaptation)

Matthew Spangler is a playwright, director, and professor based in the San Francisco Bay Area other plays include one- person shows of James Joyce's *Dubliners* and *Finnegan's Wake; A Paradise It Seems*, an adaptation of John Cheever's short stories; *Mozart!*, a musical theatre adaptation of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart's letters; as well as stage adaptations of John Steinbeck's fiction; Ernest Hemingway's short stories; Thomas Wolfe's *The Lost Boy*; Clyde Edgerton's *Where Trouble Sleeps*; and T.C. Boyle's *Tortilla Curtain* (recipient of an Edgerton Foundation New American Play Award).


Khaled Hosseini (Author)

Khaled Hosseini was born in Kabul, Afghanistan, in 1965. His father was a diplomat in the Afghan Foreign Ministry and his mother taught Farsi and history at a high school in Kabul. In 1976, the Foreign Ministry relocated the Hosseini family to Paris. They were ready to return to Kabul in 1980, but by then their homeland had witnessed a bloody communist coup and the invasion of the Soviet Army. The Hosseinis sought and were granted political asylum in the United States, and in September 1980 moved to San Jose, California. Hosseini graduated from high school in 1984 and enrolled at Santa Clara University. where he earned a bachelor's degree in biology in 1988. The following year he entered the University of California, San Diego, School of Medicine, where he earned a medical degree in 1993. He completed his residency at Cedars-Sinai medical center in Los Angeles and was a practicing internist between 1996 and 2004. In March 2001, while practicing medicine, Hosseini began writing his rst novel, The Kite Runner. Published by Bloomsbury in 2003, that debut went on to become an international bestseller and beloved classic, sold in at least 70 countries and spending more than 100 weeks on the New York Times bestseller list. In May 2007, his second novel, A Thousand Splendid Suns, debuted at #1 on the New York Times bestseller list, remaining in that spot for 15 weeks and nearly an entire year on the bestseller list. Together, the two books have sold more than 10 million copies in the United States and more than 38 million copies worldwide. The Kite Runner was adapted into a graphic novel of the same name in 2011. Hosseini's much-awaited third novel, And the Mountains Echoed, was published in 2013. In 2006, Hosseini was named a Goodwill Envoy to UNHCR, the United Nations Refugee Agency. Inspired by a trip he made to Afghanistan with the UNHCR, he later established The Khaled Hosseini Foundation, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, which provides humanitarian assistance to the people of Afghanistan. He lives in Northern California.

Giles Croft (Director)

In 1985 Giles was appointed as Artistic Director of the Gate Theatre, London. In 1989 Giles joined the National Theatre as Literary Manager and in 1995 took up the post of Artistic Director of the Palace Theatre, Watford. Giles became Artistic Director of Nottingham Playhouse in 1999 where he has directed more than 50 productions. His most recent include: *The Glass Menagerie; Any Means Necessary; Tony's Last Tape; Forever Young; Arcadia; The Second Minute; Charlie Peace: His Amazing Life And Astounding Legend*. His critically acclaimed production of The Kite Runner recently played the West End (twice at Wyndham's Theatre and the Playhouse Theatre) and is now embarking on a national tour. In 2016, Giles announced he would be stepping down from his role at Nottingham Playhouse after November 2017. His final production as Artistic Director was *The Cherry Orchard*. Giles is also a playwright and his work has been produced widely in the UK and Europe. Earlier this year his latest play *Channeling Jabez* was produced in Scotland.

A Note From The Adaptor

I first read *The Kite Runner* in 2005, two years after it came out. Most of my plays are adaptations of literature, and I teach courses in adaptation at a university in California, so whenever I read a book, I can't help imagining it as a play; an occupational reflex of sorts. *The Kite Runner*'s complex characters, nonstop narrative, many heartbreaking moments, representation of the Afghan immigrant experience in the US and its broad historical canvas seemed naturally theatrical to me, and I thought an adaptation of it could make an engaging piece of theatre.

Khaled Hosseini and I both live in the San Francisco Bay Area. A mutual friend introduced us, and we met at a coffee shop in the spring of 2006 where I presented my ideas for a play to him. Over the years, Khaled has been the most generous and supportive collaborator I could possibly imagine. He put me in touch with members of his family, with whom, as I did research for this play, I would discuss Afghan history and culture. He introduced me to musicians, writers and advocates for the Afghan community, whose knowledge and input on this project have been invaluable. He also commented on early drafts of the script. I suppose it's worth noting that I wrote the play in 2006, a year before the film was released, so there is no relationship between the two, other than their attempt to represent this epic novel in a dramatic format.

And what an epic novel it is. Part of the pleasure of reading *The Kite Runner* and, I hope, seeing the play is that there is just so much in it. This is a story about a father and son; a story about two best friends; a love story; a story about transnational immigration and refugees; a story about the relative peace in Afghanistan in the 1970s, before the wars; global politics; class and ethnicity. Above all, though, *The Kite Runner* is a story of guilt and redemption. In some sense, Amir's narrative is a plea for forgiveness – from us, as well as from

himself. I directed the first performance of *The Kite Runner* in March 2007 with a cast of student actors at San José State University, where I am a Professor of Performance Studies. A number of theatres throughout the United States and Canada have produced it since.

But this production, in London's West End, is particularly special to me, because the first play I wrote – an adaptation of Joseph Conrad's Heart of Darkness – was staged 22 years ago at the University of Sussex where I was then a student. The years I spent living in the UK and the friendships I have created here remain the most formative of my life. To see The Kite Runner presented in the country that inspired my dedication to the theatre and, in many ways, convinced me to be a writer is truly an incredible honour.
